 [Isaiah 9:6]



### "COURAGE"

***“When Joseph woke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him: he took his wife, but knew her not until she had given birth to a Son. And he called His Name Jesus.”*** (Matthew 1:24-25)

I really admire Joseph. What courage he had, to simply wake up and go finalize the marriage, bringing his wife home—all on the basis of a dream. Mary and Zechariah both had the benefit of a face-to-face meeting with a real live angel. Joseph? Well, like his Old Testament namesake, he got his instructions in dreams.

I think that most of us are a lot more like Joseph than like Mary in this. God speaks to us in less flamboyant ways—through the Bible, through prayer, through consultation with wise Christian friends. God makes Himself known, but He does it in ways that are easier to mistake.

And we worry about that, don't we? What if I get it wrong? What if I think God wants me to do something, and later on it turns into a disaster? We fret and worry, as if knowing God's will were some sort of test we could score an *F* on—as if we could fail, and disappoint God. Sometimes that worries us more than the actual outcome of the decision!

But that is not the case. Because of our Savior Jesus, we are now God's beloved children. We are very dear to Him—so dear that He lay down His own life for us!—and He is certainly not looking to set traps for us. As King David wrote, ***“As a father shows compassion to his children, so the LORD shows compassion to those who fear Him. For He knows our frame; He remembers that we are dust.”*** (Psalm 103:13-14).

There is no chance that the same God who became a human baby out of love for us would be looking for things to blame us for. With the help of the Holy Spirit, we will make the best decisions we can; and if things go badly (and face it, don't they often?), we will know that God is still with us, and we are still His children. After all, He *is* Immanuel; He is "God with us."

**THE PRAYER:** Lord, You know that I get confused easily. Guide me, and help me to trust in You when I am nervous and afraid. Amen




## THANKFUL


## Stephen Ministry...

## How Christians Around The World Celebrate Christmas

At Christmas, Christians all over the world celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ. Traditional Christmas decoration often can be admired and festive celebrations can be joined in most countries, even in many of the countries where Christianity is not the religion of the majority of people. Christmas trees are a popular decoration as are tiny sparkling lights in windows and on walls.

Christmas all over the world is generally celebrated on Christmas Day, the 25th of December. Some countries however have slightly different Christmas traditions and as such festive season celebrations take place over a longer period of time, from the beginning of December to the beginning of January.

### FRANCE



Many cities in France are decorated during the weeks leading up to Christmas and children love to open the 24 little windows of their Advent calendar. In the Alsace region, the tradition of putting up decorated Christmas trees dates back as far as the 14th century. Towns and cities are also illuminated with Christmas lights. On Christmas eve, Children put their polished shoes out in front of the chimney and hope that 'Père Noël' (Father Christmas) fills the shoes with sweets. Christmas Day, 25th of December, is a public holiday and families get together for a big feast. On this day also presents are exchanged. A special outing for many families during the festive season is a visit to the magical illuminated world of the "Jardin des Plantes" in Paris.

### ITALY

In Italy, a nativity scene, a '*presepe*', is usually put up in churches, town squares and often in homes. This is for many the most important part of the Christmas decorations. The nativity scene display with a crib filled with straw, originally stems from Italy and is now common occurrence in many countries around the world. In Italy, '*Babbo Natale*', that's how Father Christmas is called in Italian, hands out presents to children on Christmas Day. Still in many families, gifts are exchanged only on 6th of January which is the Day of Epiphany. In Italy, the people wish each other '*Buon Natale*', which means '*Merry Christmas*'.



### GERMANY



In the weeks leading up to Christmas, festive Christmas markets are set up on main squares in many cities. Houses are often decorated with fairy lights and festive ornaments in December, however, in Germany the Christmas tree is usually only put up and decorated at the homes in the morning of the 24th of December. Festive Christmas celebrations in Germany begin on the 24th of December, on Christmas Eve. Shops close very early on Christmas eve, so everyone must remember to get their Christmas shopping done by lunchtime. The 26th of December is a public holiday in Germany too and many families celebrate on this day together, go to Church or enjoy a little excursion to a nearby park.

## South Africa



In South Africa, the weeks before Christmas, people celebrate Christmas on the 25th of December. On Christmas Day the family gathers at a 'braai', which is the South African version of a barbecue (BBQ). In South Africa it is summer season in December. Many people go to Christmas mass on Christmas day as well. There are few natural Christmas trees, but some people put up decorated artificial trees in their homes. Many shopping centers are transformed with Christmas decorations and African crafts such as woven baskets made by the Zulu people and other treasures made by local designers who use recycled material.

## Columbia

Few countries celebrate the Christmas season with as much enthusiasm as they do in Colombia. For the entire month of December, the entire country is alive with vibrant celebrations that include festivals, dancing, family get-togethers, and of course, lots of eating and drinking. Tradition has always been an important aspect of Colombian culture, and this is particularly emphasized around the Christmas season. As Catholicism is still the main religion in Colombia, many of the traditional values expressed over the holiday season carry a strongly religious tone. Through out the cities and in almost every home, you'll find decorated Christmas trees, exquisite holiday lights, figures of Santa Claus or snowmen, and plenty of decorative candles. One of the most central Christmas decorations in Colombia is known as *El Pesbre*, or the nativity scene.



## Philippines



In the Philippines there is a special tradition of having a Christmas lantern, which is called '*paról*'; the lantern is star-shaped, remembering the star of Bethlehem, and mainly made out of bamboo and paper. The Christmas lanterns are on sale during Christmas time in the many markets in the Philippines. Every year, the city of San Fernando holds *Ligligan Parol* (or Giant Lantern Festival) featuring dazzling *parols*. Each *parol* consists of thousands of spinning lights that illuminate the night sky. The festival has made San Fernando the "Christmas Capital of the Philippines."

## Sweden

The Yule Goat has been a Swedish Christmas symbol dating back to ancient pagan festivals. However, in 1966, the tradition got a whole new life after someone came up with the idea to make a giant straw goat, now referred to as the Gävle Goat. The goat is more than 42 feet high, 23 feet wide, and weighs 3.6 tons. Each year, the massive goat is constructed in the same spot. Fans can even watch a livestream from the first Sunday of Advent until after the New Year when it's taken down

Create a winter wonderland with this fun craft.





**What you need:**

- Glass jar with lid but no label
- Laminated photo (that will fit in the jar)
- Small plastic Christmas trinkets
- Hot or waterproof glue
- Container with spout
- 1 cup distilled water
- 3 tsp. glycerin
- Glitter



**What you do:**

1. Unscrew lid and flip jar upside down. Glue the photo and trinkets to the inside of the lid, standing upright.
2. In a container, mix water and glycerin. Pour the mixture into the jar, leaving space at the top.
3. Spoon in some glitter.
4. When glue is dry, attach the decorated lid tightly. Shake the jar to see "snow" swirl and settle.


